At the Annual General Membership (AGM) meeting of Pax Christi International, five new board members were elected to serve terms on the International Board. The new board members are Teresia Wamuyu Wachira (Kenya), Franco Dinelli (Italy), Norbert Richter (Germany), Elena Vilenskaya (Russian Federation) and Archbishop Anthony Ledesma (Philippines). Re-elected to the board are Ann Farr (United Kingdom), Carmen Artigas (Uruguay), Fr. Neles Tebay (West Papua), and Rania Murra (Palestine)

In addition to the election of new board members, the AGM also confirmed the continued service of the current Executive Committee, consisting of Co-Presidents Bishop Kevin Dowling (South Africa) and Marie Dennis (USA), and Treasurer Fr. Jan Peters (the Netherlands). With this decision, Pax Christi International continues to affirm the value of a co-presidency that brings together the gifts of a bishop and a lay woman to leadership within the movement.

Statement: Ceasefire in Colombia

Pax Christi International congratulates the Colombian people for the historic agreement on 25 June on the ceasefire and the laying down of arms, established between the Government of Colombia and the guerrilla Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC) in Havana, Cuba, on the 23rd of June 2016.

The Colombian people have suffered for more than 50 years due to the armed conflict which has had a violent impact mainly affecting civilians (more than seven million victims, including displaced people).

Colombia is faced with many challenges after this event; the agreement is a step towards a future “Final Peace Agreement” and the be-

gining of a process of transition in Colombia which needs the effort of the Catholic Church, as well as other churches and civil society organizations, to create a culture of peace and, together with the Colombian Government and international cooperation, to strengthen the capacities of Colombian men and women to heal wounds, restore relations, and build a reconciled nation based on 'just peace' and sustainable development.



UN: Conference in Support of Israeli-Palestinian Peace

On 29 and 30 June 2016, Trevor Griffiths, Pax Christi International's delegate at the United Nations (UN) in Geneva, attended the UN International Conference in Support of Israeli-Palestinian Peace. "The conference, which was attended by peace negotiators as well as international experts from Israel, Palestine, the UN, and civil society, discussed lessons learned from past initiatives related to the Israeli-Palestinian peace process, and assessed recent initiatives by key actors". It is hoped that "the conference will promote a discussion of new ideas for a lasting solution to the conflict". Read more [here](#).



International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers

On 29 May 2016, Trevor Griffiths, Pax Christi International's representative to the UN at Geneva, attended the UN event, "International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers". The theme of the 2016 meeting was "Honouring our Heroes". The day offered participants the chance to "pay

tribute to the professionalism, dedication and courage of the peacekeepers serving in difficult conditions [...] and to the invaluable contribution of peacekeepers; it honoured the more than 3.400 peacekeepers who have lost their lives since 1948, including 128 last year." Read more [here](#).



AFRICA

Congo: 2016 Presidential Elections

In May 2016, Pax Christi Flanders' Nadia Nsayi visited the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), during which she spoke with representatives of the political majority, the opposition, EU, and UN about the presidential elections—which in theory would have taken place in November 2016. Now that the elections are no longer feasible this year, there is uncertainty surrounding the future of the country. If President Joseph Kabila decides to retain his position until the election of a new president, he would lose legitimacy and exacerbate the country's efforts to improve democracy, peace, and development. Sudan: EU risks making the humanitarian crisis worse

In its [Sudan Alert](#), PAX Netherlands calls on the EU and Germany to reconsider their policies toward Sudan which currently consists of "strengthening the position of the regime in an attempt to reduce refugees from Sudan; this will likely lead to more

humanitarian crises and yet more refugees.” The EU is in the process of approving an aid package to Sudan and seven other countries in the Horn of Africa region, totalling €155 million, in an attempt to decrease the flow of refugees to Europe. There is concern that this aid will only strengthen the abusive Sudanese regime. “PAX urges the EU to implement policies that will lead to sustainable, long term solutions to the conflict and the displacement of people.” Read more [here](#). ■

Kenya: Training on women in leadership

At the end of June 2016, Peace Tree Network, a Pax Christi International member organisation in Kenya, conducted a training on women in leadership. The training revolved around the following themes: democracy and challenges to change; women in political participation; communication skills; women in government; elections and political parties. The objective was to provide the necessary knowledge so as to increase the number of women participating in the political process in Kenya. Read more [here](#). ■

AMERICAS AND CARIBBEAN

USA: Stop Islamophobia – defend the Muslim community

On 3 June 2016, Pax Christi International and Pax Christi USA signed a statement which expresses a deep concern about the hateful anti-Muslim rhetoric that is seeping into acts of violence around the United States. It reveals the plight of Muslim sisters and

brothers regarding their difficulty of being an American Muslim today. “Many of them have had to flee their homes in search of refuge and even in the US they still live in fear of what those in privileged positions might do or say to them because of their religion.” The declaration calls on Americans, especially people of faith, to speak out and build friendships with their Muslim neighbours. Chile: Exhibition of historical archive from military dictatorship

From 8-22 June 2016, Serpaj Chile, a Pax Christi International member organisation, presented an exhibition of historical archives from the military dictatorship (1973-1990) as a means to encourage the promotion and defence of human rights. The exhibition, held at the University of Valparaiso, was comprised of photographs, slides, video and audio from the period. The executive director of Serpaj explained that the exhibition is valuable in that it “reveals the history of a country through distinct perspectives [...], which allows us to establish the groundwork to strengthen the respect for democracy and human rights.” Read more [here](#) in Spanish. ■

Brazil: CPT reaffirms Laudato Si’

From 1–4 June 2016, Comissão Pastoral da Terra (CPT), a member organisation of Pax Christi International, attended a Brazilian meeting of popular and social pastoral movements in response to Pope Francis’s call to dialogue with those who struggle for ‘land, housing and work’. The attendees denounced the concentrated use of pesticides and opposed the government’s outsourcing of

jobs. They also reaffirmed the content of the encyclical 'Laudato Si': "We are faced not with two separate crises, one environmental and the other social, but rather with one complex crisis which is both social and environmental." Read more in Portuguese [here](#). ■

ASIA - PACIFIC

New Zealand: Work to support refugees

At the Annual General Membership meeting of Pax Christi sections and member organizations in 2016 June, Pax Christi Aotearoa/New Zealand representatives Kevin and Barbara McBride shared that currently New Zealand only grants asylum to 750 refugees per year. Pax Christi Aotearoa/New Zealand is part of a coordinated lobbying effort to get the New Zealand government to double that effort. Australia: Resettlement of Syrian refugees In its *Disarming Times*, Pax Christi Australia published a reflection from Fiona Hill who lived on and off with a family in a Syrian village for over 30 years where she was an educational worker. Fiona writes about the struggles that the inhabitants of the village experienced. Her Syrian family (three men, four women and nineteen children) has resettled in Australia. Fiona supports Pax Christi Australia's demand to the Australian government to accept 12,000 Syrian refugees

Sri Lanka: International Day in Support of the Survivors of Torture

On 24 June 2016, Human Rights Office Kandy, a Pax Christi International member organisation in Sri Lanka, held a public gathering and an exhibition in commemoration of the 'International Day in Support of the Survivors of Torture'. It also had a signature campaign asking the Attorney General to prosecute the torture perpetrators as well as to activate the Torture Act no 22 of 1994. Read more and see pictures [here](#). ■

EUROPE

Austria/Italy: Build bridges not walls

On 4 June 2016, Pax Christi Austria and Pax Christi Italy set a sign at the Brenner Pass against its closure with an ecumenical prayer service under the motto "Build Bridges, not Walls!" The Brenner Pass is one of the most important connection points between southern and northern Europe. The activists pinned European passports on the border fence with quotes from Pope Francis to show solidarity with the refugees. The service included bilingual prayers, as well as the symbolic building of a stone bridge which

EU: Statement condemning new policies to contain migration

Pax Christi International, along with over 120 other organisations, has co-signed the [statement](#), “NGOs strongly condemn new EU policies to contain migration”, ahead of the 28-29 June 2016 European Council session. The signatory NGOs “express their grave concern about the direction the EU is taking by making deterrence and return the main objective of the Union’s relationship with third countries. [...] We are disappointed to see that once again the emphasis on deterrence leaves no clear commitments to open up safe and regular channels to Europe for those in need of international protection and for other migrants.”

EFAD: Call to Action for Europe

On 29 June 2016, Open Society Foundations and the European Forum on Armed Drones (EFAD) held an event entitled, “Armed Drones, Counter-Terrorism and Human Rights: The Need for a European Voice”. During the event EFAD launched its [Call to Action](#) for Europe, which is [supported](#) by Pax Christi International. The speakers, including PAX Netherland’s Wim Zwijnenburg, “provide[d] first-hand insight into drone operations and the impact of drone strikes.” “With the surge in proliferation of this technology – including among European states – it is past time to discuss the legal,

ethical and security challenges and to regulate the use of unmanned armed systems.” Read more [here](#). ■

More than a reminder – Relations between Germany and Eastern Europe

Pax Christ Germany issued a press release on 22 June 2016 on the 75th anniversary of Germany’s attack on the Soviet Union in 1941. One of the goals of the attack was to fight against the so-called Jewish-Bolshevik enemy. The Pax Christi section urges that even though our perception of Russia is currently being negatively influenced by the conflict in Ukraine, old enemy patterns should not be revived. The relationship between Russia and the EU should be improved, starting with an end to the sanctions. The anniversary must be a wakeup call rather than just a mere reminder of the importance to continue with political dialogue. Read more in German [here](#). ■

MIDDLE EAST

Gaza: Action Alert to end the blockade

On 15 June 2016, the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns, a Pax Christi International member organisation in the United States, sent out an action alert calling on the U.S. Congress to end the Gaza blockade. Gaza has been largely sealed off from the rest of the world for almost a decade, which in turn has deprived the ordinary people of Gaza the opportunity to lead normal lives. Take action and ask Congress to make a public statement calling for an end to the Gaza blockade now, to insist that Israeli security controls must not

deprive Palestinians of their human rights, and to support U.S. funding for Gaza needs. Read more and take action [here](#). ■

[Syria: More than a million Syrians still under siege](#)

In the May 2016, second quarterly [Siege Watch](#), PAX Netherlands and the Syria Institute report that the diplomatic efforts in recent months have not had positive results. Although there has been an increased effort to provide aid to besieged areas, “they have been inconsistent, insufficient, and unbalanced due to continuing access restrictions, limiting their effectiveness.” Furthermore, contrary to the UN’s report that 592.000 individuals are living in besieged areas, according to Siege Watch that number has reached 1.015.275. The deliberate starving of civilians violates the Fourth Geneva Convention, thus making it a war crime. “Focus must remain on lifting the sieges and ensuring the unrestricted movement of civilians.” Read more [here](#). ■

ADVOCACY & CAMPAIGNING

[Europe’s Vocation to Promote Peace in the World](#) The Commission of the Bishops’ Conferences of the European Community (COMECE) consulted Pax Christi International’s Senior Policy Advisor, Fr. Paul Lansu, in the drafting of the report, “Europe’s Vocation To Promote Peace In The World”, which was presented and published on 14 June 2016. It is hoped that the report will “assist policy makers as they prepare the recommendations on peace and security to

the European Council next June.” It states that “the European Union has not only a historical and legal but also a moral responsibility to contribute to building peace in the world.” The European peace policy should “promote pre-emptive peace and the transformation of violent conflicts through means of justice.” Read the report in [English](#), [German](#), and [French](#). ■

[Stay Human Campaign](#)

PAX Netherlands supports the “Stay Human” [campaign](#) which was launched on 15 June 2016, as a means to give a voice to, as well as to reinforce the views of, the majority of the Dutch population surrounding the refugee debate. PAX’s director Jan Gruiters states, “Our focus is on the most vulnerable but also on those who fear that the opportunities for a good future for their children are being put under pressure by the arrival of refugees. These people cannot be dismissed as xenophobic and racist, but their concerns cannot be used as justification for turning away refugees. HUMAN RIGHTS

[USA: Act now! Temporary Protected Status for Central American refugees](#)

On 9 June 2016, Pax Christi USA and the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns, a Pax Christi International member organisation in the United States, sent a letter to President Obama and Homeland Security Secretary Jeh

Johnson asking for “Temporary Protected Status” (TPS) for people fleeing violence in El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras. The letter states that “the United States has the legal and moral responsibility to not return children, families, and individuals that have been subject to persecution to extremely violent areas” and urges “the U.S. to respond to this humanitarian crisis with fair and humane solutions.” Read more [here](#). [Right to development & right to international solidarity](#)

Pax Christi International co-signed a joint oral statement on the [right to development](#) as well as on the [right to international solidarity](#), both of which were presented at the 32nd Regular Session of the Human Rights Council (13 June–1 July 2016). The first declaration notes the existence of “great obstacles in the realisation of the right to development due mainly to the long-standing politicization [...] and encourages States to end the polarization which characterised previous negotiations and highlights.” The second statement states that “there is a great need to move from the principle of international solidarity towards the recognition of the right of individuals and peoples to international solidarity.” ■

[Haiti: UPR on human rights situation](#)

Pax Christi International is one of the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) submitters on the human rights situation in Haiti. The report will be cited at the 26th session of the UPR working group in October. It gives

recommendations to the Haitian government on poverty eradication based on human rights; environmental and human rights protection in regard to mining projects; decrease violence in the country; respect the rights of people in custody; promoting the right to education; and ensure that birth registration is available for everyone to exercise the right to an identity. [Act now! Honduras: Tell Congress to suspend aid](#)

On 15 June 2016, the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns, a Pax Christi International member organisation in the United States, urged everyone to join them in honouring [Berta Cáceres](#), who was murdered on 3 March 2016, by asking the U.S. Congress to support [H.R. 5474, the Berta Cáceres Human Rights in Honduras Act](#). The bill seeks to “suspend U.S. security assistance with Honduras until such time as human rights violations by Honduran security forces cease and their perpetrators are brought to justice.” You can take action now by sending a [letter](#) to your representative and your senators. DISARMAMENT

Chain Reaction 2016

Pax Christi International supports [Chain Reaction](#), which is “a series non-violent actions at nuclear-weapons and nuclear-disarmament related sites and political offices around the world from July 8 (20th Anniversary of the World Court case against nuclear weapons) until October 2 (International Day for Nonviolence, Gandhi’s birthday).” These events will allow civil society organisations from all over the world “to highlight the immorality and insecurity of nuclear weapons and to oppose the institutions and policies perpetuating the nuclear arms race.” Chain Reaction will hold actions at key locations to celebrate nuclear abolition policies and support creative events such as bike rides for peace, or ‘breaking the chains’ of nuclear weapons. ■

UK: Actions against Trident

The Network of Christian Peace Organisations, of which Pax Christi UK is a member, issued a [Trident Briefing](#) to encourage engagement in critical debate about the Trident vote. “This year British MPs will vote on whether or not to replace Trident, the UK’s nuclear weapons system, [at a cost of at least £205 billion](#).” The anti-nuclear [event](#) in February revealed the growing discontent amongst the populace as well as Parliament’s opposition of the renewal of the nuclear weapons system. Pax

Christi UK took part in a faith [protest](#) against Trident on 27 June, and has organised a mass [lobby](#) on 13 July, along with CND and 20 other national organisations. ■

Pax Christi Montreal ‘Call to Action’: Abolition of nuclear weapons

On 20 May 2016, Pax Christi Montreal had its Annual General Meeting during which it endorsed a call to action directed to the Government of Canada to play a more active role in the abolition of nuclear weapons. The call to action urges the government to “sponsor a resolution in the 71st Session of the UN General Assembly that seeks a mandate to negotiate a comprehensive, legally binding Convention that prohibits nuclear weapons and requires their verifiable elimination” as well as to “ensure that participating states welcome and encourage the input and engagement of civil society.” Read the document [here](#) in English and French. ■

PAX report: Worldwide Investments in Cluster Munitions

On 16 June 2016, PAX Netherlands published a [report](#) entitled, “Worldwide Investments in Cluster Munitions: A shared responsibility”. Over the past four years, 158 financial institutions have invested \$28 billion in companies that produce cluster munitions. The report states that although cluster munitions are internationally prohibited under the Convention on Cluster Munitions (CCM), they have been used by the Saudi Arabian-led coalition in Yemen. PAX’s Suzanne Oosterwijk states, “No financial institution should want to put money in companies that make cluster

munitions. These weapons maim and kill indiscriminately – and their investments support that these illegal weapons might show up on the battlefield, putting civilian lives at risk." Read more [here](#) in Dutch. ■

Environmental dimensions of armed conflicts and SDGs

On 2 June 2016, Toxic Remnants of War Network, of which PAX Netherlands is a member, held a Green Room event. The focus of the assembly was on addressing the environmental dimensions of armed conflict to achieve sustainable development goals. "Many of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are necessary for peace (SDG16) and, in turn, peace is an enabling condition for other SDGs." It was designed to consider the gaps in legal protection and international assistance that should be addressed in the future. The presentations focused on the Ukrainian conflict with respect to the key elements of environmental rebuilding; the effects of the Syrian conflict on the environment; and the limitations of international legal provisions to protect the environment. PEACE SPIRITUALITY & PEACE EDUCATION

Visit of Polish witnesses of German occupation

On 30 May 2016, Prelate Dietmar Giebelmann from Pax Christi Germany's office in Mainz visited six Polish survivors who lived during

the German occupation of Poland; they were hosted at a monastery near Mainz for one week. Throughout the week more than 1.000 young adults met with the witnesses and listened to their experiences – one of the witnesses survived the concentration camp in Potulice, which was a detention center for children. Giebelmann thanked the guests for their willingness to share their painful stories. The witnesses' goal is to raise awareness about the dangers of political manipulation. Italy: Non-violence at school

Pax Christi Italy supported a workshop on 18 and 19 June 2016 with the objective of providing the participants with the knowledge and necessary means to implement non-violence in times of stress and unhappiness. The workshop, which utilised active learning techniques, consisted of non-violent training exercises, moments of reflection, sharing of experiences, and the theatre of the oppressed. The workshop was intended primarily for teachers and all individuals who have educational responsibilities (parents, voluntary work, NGOs etc.). Read more [here](#) in Italian. ■

Austria: War in media – Media on war

Pax Christi Austria and the 'Haus der Begegnung' held a lecture and discussion on "War in media" on 16 June 2016 in Innsbruck (Austria). During the first part the lecture focused on the influence that media has in shaping our understanding of war. A comparison between historical reports on wars showed the manipulative intentions

behind the stereotyping of the enemy and how it has been disseminated throughout society. Ongoing wars in Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq and others were used as examples for the current situation. The second part focused on the homogenisation of war reports, war propaganda and the influence of social networks. Read more in German [here](#).
